He debuted the short-story genre in Bengali with 'Bhikharini' (The Beggar - woman), published in 1877, but by the writers own appellation, this was a set of 'connected ramblings' rather than a short-story. He wrote his first short-story 'The Ghat's story' in 1884

'The Cabuliwallah' (1892) is one of his well-known short-stories and it throws light on the love and affection of a father for his daughter. It is a story of Cabuliwallah who befriends little girl Mini. In the beginning of the story, we see that Mini left her play and ran to the window and in the street below, there was a Cabuliwallah walking slowly along. He wore the loose, soiled clothing of his people and a tall turban. He carried a bag on his back and boxes of grapes in his hand.
